At Keithcot Farm Primary we care about the needs of our students and we recognise that some of our students have challenges with mental wellbeing, anxiety, depression and feeling like they don't fit in.

Research into the effects of therapy dogs in schools is showing a range of benefits. These include an increase in school attendance, gains in confidence and a decrease in the student's anxiety. This results in improved learning outcomes, such as increases in reading and writing levels, positive changes towards learning and improved motivation. Another benefit is that it enhances relationships with peers and teachers due to experiencing trust and unconditional love from a therapy dog. This in turn helps students learn how to express their feelings and enter into more trusting relationships.

Toby belongs to our AP Ms Helen Dunlop and has been working in Pod 3 on Mondays and Tuesdays this term. He is doing a fantastic job.

This playground has been a fantastic addition to our school. Something for everyone to take pride in, look after and most importantly ENJOY!






HOUSE 2A - RECEPTION / YEAR 1

Did you know?

There is direct correlation between attendance and achievement.

Frequent absences make it difficult for students to maintain friendships and make progression in their learning.

Being half an hour late each day from Reception to Year 10 equals missing one and a half years of schooling.

Patterns of attendance/absence are set up in the early years of schooling.

Being absent 10 days in any term is considered chronic non-attendance and puts students at risk academically.

Poor attendance makes it difficult for students to form positive relationships with their peers.

Research shows that students who are often absent from school are likely to earn less than their peers as adults.

Every Day Counts


POD 3 SCIENCE FAIR


OSHC REMINDER

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

All schools are required to collect information about the numbers of students that they provide adjustments to under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and Disability Standards of Education (2005). From 2018, this data will be used as the basis for national funding.

The NCCD involves the collection of:

- * the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students.
- * the level of adjustment provided to students.
- * student's type of disability if known.

Under the model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficuties, health and mental health conditions.

If your child is identified for inclusion in the Collection, the required information will be included in this year's data collection.

FORTNITE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS ABOUT THE GAME FORTNITE

There are two general game modes with the popular Fortnite Battle Royale starting with 100 players who have to out live others to win the "last man standing" event.

Children can also team up with their friends or other online gamers to form a **squad** and this adds in a much more social element to the game. However if their friends aren't online, they can join into other squads of "*randomers*" online. These are groups of 4 where your children are contactable by anyone in their squad. They can speak directly to each other. We've heard reports that children as young as 7 and 8 years old have been playing in squads with people in their 50's after 12pm at night. Fortnite is rated M and not recommended for anyone under the age of 12.

These are complete strangers of all ages. Fortniters don't like to call them strangers though so they're referred to as "randomers". This is where it can become dangerous for your children. They can be teamed up with anyone and everyone from all around the world so make sure you talk to your children about squads and about the safety of gaming online with "randomers" and that they are still considered strangers. It is important to have regular conversations with your children and make sure you are aware of the different features these games offer. Make use of the parental controls and check the settings regularly.

"At least one in four children have been contacted on Fortnite by someone they don't know."

Another thing to note is if your child is using the voice chat feature to communicate with their squad, be aware what is said in your house by other members of the family while this feature is in use could have been easily overheard by friends and "randomers".

There are also options for in game purchases, there have been reports of children spending a small fortune on this game to advance faster. Is your credit card connected to your game console?

How do I manage screen time for my kids when they're playing Fortnite?

When each match only takes 20 minutes, it's easy to fall into the trap of "just one more" -- sort of how you end up binge-watching an entire season of a Netflix series. But you can take advantage of the quick matches by using them as a natural stopping point in gameplay. Some kids benefit from using a timer, limiting themselves to a certain number of matches per day.

What steps can you take to safeguard your child?


- If opening account, it is important that they do not create a username that could give away any personal details. There is also no age verification process. Therefore, be aware of the risks if your child has, or wants to, open an account.
- Fortnite offers three levels of privacy settings: Public, where anyone can enter your child's online party;
 Friends, where only friends can join a party; and Private, which means that no one can enter your child's party without being invited by the child themselves. Discuss the level appropriate to your child.
- Fortnite also allows for Voice-Chat to be disabled.
 Make yourself and your child familiar with the game's settings and, if you deem it inappropriate, turn Voice-Chat off.

Speak to your child about unwanted contact and tell them what to do if someone speaks to them in a nasty or inappropriate way, or asks them for personal information. Ask them to come to you if they are unsure about unwanted contact or have be exposed to something inappropriate.

How can you report inappropriate contact between my child and another player?

Fortnite offers an in-game feedback tool in the Main Menu of the game to report any bad behaviour.
